


# New Mexico section of Route 66 named as a top travel experience for 2024

National Geographic recently unveiled its selections for Best of the World 2024 and the section of Route 66 that runs through New Mexico has been named one of the top travel experiences. Each year the publication releases the list to put a spotlight on places around the world and illuminates diversity across various communities. New Mexico is one of four U.S. destinations this year that made the list, which is written by National Geographic travel editors, experts and expedition leaders. Hacienda at Armendaris near Truth or Consequences was also picked as one of the best new hotels for 2024.

# Governor announces 50-year water action plan, setting path for water conservation, innovation

Gov. Michelle Lujan-Grisham recently announced a water action plan with the goal of ensuring that New Mexicans will have access to clean water for the next 50 years. New Mexico is currently one of the driest states in the west and is no stranger to drought. Water experts have predicted that the state will have 25 percent less water to use in the next five decades. This means New Mexicans would have to drastically reduce and change their water usage to adjust to this bleak reality.

The Lujan Grisham administration—with the help of leading scientists, hydrologists, geologists, and researcherscreated a 50-Year Water Action Plan to safeguard the state's most precious resource for future generations. This plan has also taken into consideration vital input from nations, tribes, pueblos, farmers, and other stakeholders. Some of the key provisions would include a water education campaign to reduce community water consumption by 10 percent and a new surface water discharge permitting program to keep rivers, streams, and lakes clean.

# Bernalillo County reminds public to support local during construction

If you've driven on Bridge Blvd. lately then you've probably noticed the construction that's been going on for a while. As the construction continues, Bernalillo County, along with South Valley MainStreet, has reminded folks to support the local businesses that have taken a hit because of it.

The construction project that runs from the Atrisco Riverside Drain to Young Ave. is the second of a four-phase design project for the Bridge Boulevard Corridor Redevelopment Plan. Traffic patterns were recently adjusted from the eastbound lanes to the westbound lanes of Bridge. Businesses like El Paisa, Los Forasteros Mexican Food, Imprenta Chihuahua Print Shop, Cuauhtemoc Tortilleria, Carniceria La Diferencia and Mr. G's Automotive are experiencing construction right at their front door, but they are still open and ready to serve customers.

The current phase is expected to be completed this Fall. Phase 3, between Young Ave. and Lura Pl., is currently in the study phase. Design is scheduled for later this year and construction is anticipated to begin in 2026.






#### Bitterfest 2024







oll in the hay, romp, make whoopie. Most everyone has a list of sex euphemisms tucked away in their back pocket, at the ready, for those times when it's too embarrassing to utter that dreaded three-letter word. There are endless pop-culture references in movies and songs that get right up to that line of good taste without crossing over into crass territory. Whether it's a solo expedition or a group thing, sexual activities are a part of almost all of our lives, yet there's still a dearth of places one can go for healthy conversations about them. The internet is brimming with unrealistic depictions of sexual encounters that are far cries from educational material, and walking into an average sex shop can be confusing and intimidating, especially for those who's favorite flavors are not always represented in film and TV. There is, luckily, one sexual oasis for all walks of life in the Duke City.

Tucked away in Nob Hill sits Self Serve, an all-inclusive sex store and education center where customers can find products and resources to scratch their itch. Owner Matie Fricker, along with employees and longtime community supporters, recently celebrated the store's 17th anniversary, making it a year shy of being old enough to shop there. Fricker and a former business partner opened the store nearly two decades ago as a sexual resource hub. Fricker's business model hasn't changed much at all. People of all genders and sexualities can still find employees ready to talk through

which toys are the best for the job and the safest ways to do said job.

"My two theme songs for our 17th birthday were 'Dancing Queen' [by ABBA], because she's 17, and then the other one was, 'I'm Still Standing,' by Elton John, because that is also the vibe," Fricker says.

In-store conversations are generally straightforward, to the point and mostly free of innuendo. But it's hard for even the most mature brains to avoid reverting back to silly word play. Self Serve's website, for example, is peppered with the phrase, "good vibes only," and it's hard to avoid talking about the "vibe" of the store with Fricker and store employees.

But Fricker says metaphors are helpful when talking about subjects that can be a little uncomfortable for some.

"Often when talking about erectile challenges, I use football analogies," she says. "Like, you've got to practice the way you want to play, that sort of thing. It helps people understand, because most people don't have a working awareness of their comfort and their desires, and then they walk into a place like this and their nervous systems are a little frazzled."

She also makes a point to make sure employees feel safe when talking to customers who, thanks to the internet and what Fricker calls "sticky floor stores," may not fully understand appropriate boundaries when discussing sex. But since Fricker also views shame as a major roadblock to living a sexually healthy life, she came up with a mnemonic device to help customers learn more appropriate ways to talk about

sex without simultaneously running them off. REBA is an acronym for: Redirect, Educate, Boundaries and Ask to leave. Fricker says there's rarely a situation where a customer is actually asked to leave, but admits "the world still has some creeps in it."

Fricker says she came up with REBA—she hopes to come up with a Dolly Parton acronym one day—as a way to encourage positive and productive conversations with customers, while also giving staff the autonomy to speak up for themselves when things veer off into unhealthy territory. Most of the time, Fricker says, what seems like creep behavior is just ignorance.

"A lot of times when people come in, and they're uncomfortable, or they're nervous, or they're scared, it can really appear they might be boundary pushers," she says. "Really, they just need some education."

That education is always important for folks at Self Serve, but especially in the next week or so as both regular and seasonal customers will soon start shuffling in, looking for that perfect Valentine's Day toy or lingerie.

#### More than Consumerism

It's pretty easy to dismiss Valentine's Day as just another holiday aimed at encouraging people to buy more stuff. Fricker says the holiday can elicit complicated feelings for even employees, but that ultimately it's a day when she and staff get to witness people doing nice things for people they love.

"We love it, because it is an excuse for people to show up and

show people how they love them, and I wish there were more days like that," she says.

But, she adds, the store also offers solace for folks who find themselves alone on Valentine's Day.

Day.

"We also get people who come in and they go, 'I'm single and I'm sad. This feels really complicated, and I just want to do something nice for myself," she says. "And we go, 'That's a great idea, we are so excited. We are here for you.' The store's name is Self Serve for a reason."

One thing that sets Self Serve apart from other stores besides the non-sticky floors—is that a version of every toy on its shelves has been tested and vetted, either by a volunteer or someone on staff. No, that doesn't mean the actual products on display have been used. Store manager Stevie Wilke coordinates getting sample toys from manufacturers and then matches them up with folks who might be into them. If it doesn't pass the test, for whatever reason, it doesn't make it to the shelf

Wilke says fully understanding products and how user-friendly they are helps guide conversations with customers about not only which item best fits their needs, but also what each person's needs are.

"A lot of people don't expect to have that kind of conversation in a store like this," Wilke says. "They expect someone to be like, 'Oh, here's our most expensive toy,' and try to just upsell you and make you leave having spent a bunch of money, but we really do genuinely care about people here and just want what's best for them."

Sometimes those conversations with customers include steering them away from things such as numbing creams, which Fricker and Wilke both say present enough of a danger that Self Serve won't carry them. Other times those conversations are more like a counseling session. Wilke says sometimes they'll talk to customers about "not just how to practice safe sex, but also how to have conversations with your partner about not pressuring you into doing things you don't want to do with your body until you're ready.

"After that point, what they want to do with it is up to them and no judgment, no shade," Wilke says. "We'll sell them that giant butt plug if they still want it, absolutely. But we're going to make sure that they are seen and understood and given all the information they need to make that decision for themselves."

## **Telling Stories**

Lip Service hits two-year milestone

oming out' looks different for everyone. For some folks it's simple, quick, and not as dramatic as the movies make it seem. For others however, coming out feels like climbing Mount Everest during the most extreme snow storm known to man.

'Coming Out' also doesn't just happen once. It's often a lifelong journey.

It starts within, then it's coming out to your friends and family, classmates and coworkers and every time you meet a new person.

The scary part is sometimes coming out can just be downright dangerous depending on a person's circumstances.

Local podcaster Pamm Meyers realized this and decided to make a safe place for LGBTQ+ folks to share their stories.

"I started thinking years ago that I wanted to write a book about coming out stories," says Meyers.

Instead of writing a book, a friend of Meyers suggested she start a podcast where folks from the LGBTQ+ community have a safe space to tell their coming out stories. On Valentine's Day two years ago, Lip Service: A Podcast of Our Coming Out Stories, was born.

Meyers started her

In the two years since launching Lip Service, Meyers has published roughly 90 episodes. All episodes involve stories of coming out, but some dive into religion, the pain of being outed by someone else and what it's like coming out in places other than New Mexico.

"Really, it takes bravery and courage for people to share their

coming out stories, a lot of people are very afraid to do it," says Meyers.

Getting a guest to tell their story on the podcast isn't always easy but Meyers has had some luck getting all different walks of life to stop by and open their heart for all to hear.

"A lot of them I know or I have connected with through volunteer work," she says. "I'm on the Equality New Mexico board, and

I was previously the executive director of the New Mexico Out Business Alliance and the National Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce. So I've connected with a lot of these people just through my network, but some have reached out to me."

Lip Service has also hosted guests who have made a strong impact in the LGBTQ+ community here in New Mexico. In the early days, Lip Service hosted Marshal Martinez, executive director of Equality New Mexico. More recent guests include Storm Miguel Florez, a trans and queer filmmaker who recently directed the documentary, *The Whistle*.

Preparing for an interview takes a lot of time and work for Meyers.

"I do some research on the individuals that I'm going to interview and try to find out a little bit about them first. And then we just proceed once they log on to record," says Meyers.

Lip Service: A Podcast of Our Coming Out has seen a lot of growth within the past two years of its initial release. In its first year it reached around 2,000 listeners and now has more than 5,000 listens. Meyers hopes the podcast continues to grow in the future as time goes on.

"I would love to see that go bonkers. I'd love to see that number explode, because I think it's so important to record our stories for history, and to support those who are still coming out to know that they're not alone," says Meyers. "People reach out to me in person, through messenger, and email. Every single one is like, 'Thank you so much for doing this for our community."


Brown originally found the world of theater in their home state of Florida, which diverted them from involvement in gang activity. He expresses wanting that opportunity for others who might want to foster, or

For all the hopeless romantics out there who smoke pot, the relationship between sex and weed couldn't be clearer: Marijuana makes sex better. The topic hovers at the intersection of two stigmatized vectors, and has received little attention in the scientific community for that reason. But as stigmas around both weed and sex dissolve, researchers are starting to ask why so many people use the one to enhance the other.

Last year, some randy scientists published a study in the *Journal of Cannabis Research* just in time for Valentine's Day that found that weed enhances almost every aspect of sex. The study was based on survey results that told the researchers something every pothead has known for ages: Weed strengthens desire and increases sexual pleasure. The mechanisms behind the effects are still mysterious and manifold, though.

The study was headed up by University of Denver's Amanda Moser, who was working at East Carolina University at the time it was published. Moser moonlights as a sexologist with an expertise in weed.

Moser and her team surveyed 811 adults who had used cannabis, asking them to rate sexual functioning and satisfaction in relation to cannabis use on a scale. Over 70 percent of the participants reported increased desire and "orgasm intensity." The researchers found that neither age nor gender had a significant effect on the results.

They also found that a majority of respondents who masturbated reported that weed increased their pleasure (62.5 percent).

There are some limitations for the study, though. Like all surveys, the results are totally dependent on human reporting, and—as any grizzled old detective will tell you—people make for terrible witnesses. The brain isn't very good at recalling events, and memories can be influenced by even the slightest nudge.

The participant group was also made up of what's known as a "convenience sample"—in other words, a hand-picked group that's "convenient" rather than using randomized or probability sampling.

Nevertheless, the results will ring true to most marijuana users. But if it's true, then how does weed make people hornier?

One hint about a possible cause for the perceived enhancement can be found in the sweaty prose of a particular section of Moser's study that focuses on sensuality.

The majority of respondents said that weed enhanced their sense of taste (71.9 percent) and touch (71 percent) either "slightly" or "significantly." Our culture tends to focus on the visual and auditory aspects of sex these days, but it should never be forgotten that it's a full-body experience that involves all of the senses. The majority of participants reported no changes in their senses of sight, hearing and smell.

"The enhancement of taste and touch could increase overall sexual functioning and satisfaction because these are two senses that are heavily used during sexual intercourse," wrote the study's authors.

Scientists associated with the Saint Louis University School of Medicine published a study in the journal Sexual Medicine in 2019 that surveyed 373 women at an obstetrics and gynecology clinic about cannabis. More than a third reported having used weed before sex, and the majority said they experienced an increase in their sex drive, improved orgasm and a "more pleasurable" sexual experience, overall (60.6 percent, 52.8 percent and 68.5 percent, respectively). The researchers said some women reported a decrease in sexual pain as well.

Notably, women who used marijuana before sex and those who used it more frequently were more than twice as likely to report satisfactory orgasms than those who did not use marijuana before sex or used infrequently.

According to the study's authors, there are a number of good theories as to why it works:

"It has been postulated that it leads to improvement in sexual function simply by lowering stress and anxiety. It may slow the temporal perception of time and prolong the feelings of pleasurable sensations. It may lower sexual inhibitions and increase confidence and a willingness to experiment."

The researchers note the reported heightening of senses associated with weed that Moser's study also found. They also cite a 2012 paper that found that regular female marijuana users reported an increased physical closeness when using marijuana before sex.

It's known that marijuana has some sort of interaction with the system that controls sex hormones—how they interact with each other and how they are released—it's just not clear what the nature of that interaction actually is. It's also known that cannabis has an effect on testosterone levels, which play a role in sex drive, but again, it's unclear to what end.

But as both studies point out, the implications of the limited data indicate that marijuana may provide a pathway to new treatments for sexual dysfunction, particularly for women.

Moser has also said that cannabis "can potentially close the orgasm inequality gap."

"Women may be more likely to orgasm when using cannabis before sexual encounters," wrote Moser, "which could contribute to equity in the amount of sexual pleasure and satisfaction experienced by both women and men. Sex therapists could incorporate use of cannabis in states where it is currently legal."

But until scientists can do more research on weed's effect on sexual function, it will be left up to consenting adults to take on the role of citizen researchers and conduct their own experiments in this fascinating field behind closed doors.

What will these intrepid explorers find on the other side of the boundaries of humankind's collected knowledge? We're not totally sure, but you can bet your socks that we'll be right there on the front lines, where the action is. It's a dirty job, but someone has to do it.

# Illegal Dispensaries Tied to International Crime Ring

he governor's Organized Crime Commission and New Mexico State Police recently served search warrants at two dispensaries accused of operating illegally.

According to a news release from the State Police, the Organized Crime Commission was notified by the state's Cannabis Control Division (CCD) about two suspected dispensaries operated by The Cannabis Revolution Dispensary. Agents from the Tax Fraud Investigation Division assisted law enforcement in the investigation.

Authorities report that unlicensed products totalling around \$1 million in retail value were seized between two locations.

The news release alleged that the dispensaries "are believed to have ties to international organized crime," although it doesn't specify those ties.

In October, the CCD revoked the license of Golden Roots—which was operating under the name Cannabis Revolution Dispensary—for illegally obtaining and transporting illicit cannabis and failing to enter data into the state's marijuana tracking software. The next month, it was issued a Notice of Contemplated Action after the dispensary allegedly continued operations without a license.

# Senators Call For Full Legalization From DEA

A letter signed by 12 U.S. senators is calling on the Drug

Enforcement Administration (DEA) to publicly disclose its review into rescheduling marijuana and to fully legalize the drug at the federal level.

The letter was sent to
Attorney General Merrick
Garland and DEA Administrator
Anne Milgram. The senators said
the DEA and the Department
of Health and Human
Services (HHS) should be fully
transparent in their review
process regarding rescheduling
marijuana as Schedule III.

But it also said the drug should be fully descheduled instead.

"Rescheduling would do little to rectify the most severe harms of the current system," the senators wrote. "Many of the [Controlled Substances Act]'s criminal penalties for marijuana will continue as long as marijuana remains in the CSA, because those penalties are based on the quantity of marijuana involved, not the drug's schedule status."

The DEA has not publicly responded to the letter.

#### **Texas AG Fights Decriminalization**

The attorney general of Texas is suing five of the state's cities that have passed cannabis decriminalization ordinances.

Republican Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton filed the suit against the cities of Austin, San Marcos, Killeen, Elgin and Denton, claiming that Texas statute and the state's constitutional provisions prevent cities from enacting local laws that conflict with state laws.

"I will not stand idly by

as cities run by pro-crime extremists deliberately violate Texas law and promote the use of illicit drugs that harm our communities," said Paxton in a news release.

New Mexico cities across the border from Texas have been selling recreational-use cannabis to Texans in droves. Dispensaries in the small border town of Sunland Park, New Mexico have sold enough weed to catapult the city to the second highest spot in statewide adult-use sales.

It's believed that if more Texas cities near the border decriminalize marijuana posession, those sales will jump even higher.


