# **Nonprofit Says Most Women** Living on the Street are Sex Trafficked

Outreach group builds bonds, warns of dangerous men

The majority of women living on Albuquerque's streets are victims of sex trafficking and have fewer options for shelter and support services. Those women face further challenges that men experiencing homelessness generally don't.

The assessment comes from one of the city's only nonprofit agencies doing nighttime street outreach to hundreds of women — AsUR New Mexico (as you are). While there are sex trafficking victims of all genders - defined as the use of force, fraud or coercion to engage in sex acts — the group works exclusively with those who identify as female.

We know many trafficking victims who are staying in tents or who are sleeping on blankets and being trafficked from, literally, the sidewalk," AsUR **Executive Director Christine** Barber said. "Or they sleep on someone's couch; but then they're forced into doing dates for that. Everything costs; not

even sleeping is free for women on the street.

Much of the outreach is focused along Coors Boulevard from Central Avenue to I-40 and in the International District — the most active areas, Barber said.

AsUR conducts its own point-in-time count, in the same vein as the annual one led by the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness but specific to the women it serves.

'We count the number of women who are on the street at any given time, and then we count the number who fit the indicators of doing dates," Barber said. "We know statistically [that] most women who do dates are trafficking victims."

She explained that "doing a date" is the common terminology used on the streets for a sexual exchange. Barber said there are hundreds of women on the streets each night who fit the indicators; some are from out-of-town.

"There are so many more women now, so many more," she said.

#### 'No nice traffickers'


Barber founded AsUR last year after leading Street Safe New Mexico for 10 years. During street outreach it

distributes feminine hygiene products, female condoms and other supplies while building relationships and trust with the women. AsUR also gives referrals for housing and behavioral health and substance abuse treatment.

A key part of the outreach

is handing out a newsletter featuring the "Bad Guy List" — a profile of men who have attacked or harmed women on the street. The hope is to spread the word and warn others.

"There are no nice traffickers. None of us who work in this field have ever seen a nice trafficker," Barber said.

She said one of the biggest challenges the women face is finding a safe place to stay

while waiting for stable housing. While there are currently a handful of options — referred to as an aftercare agency or safe house — demand is high.

"Right now if they're not in the aftercare agency they're back on the street, and back with their trafficker," Barber said. "They have so much trauma. It takes a lot of work to get one trafficking victim into a place; there's security issues."

Barber said smaller, more accessible shelters that are targeted to certain populations like the disabled, elderly and those who are being sex trafficked would help.AsUR is primarily funded by private donations. More information is at www.asurnewmexico.org.





#### When, where and how can I vote?

Early voting at the Bernalillo County Clerk's Office Annex (1500 Lomas Blvd NW) began Oct. 8, and will continue until Oct. 18.

Additional early voting locations will be available starting Saturday, Oct. 19. Find the full list of early voting locations, along with Election Day polling locations and hours, at berncoclerk.gov/elections/early-voting/.

The option to request an absentee ballot is also available until Oct. 22. To request one, go to the New Mexico Secretary of State Voter Services website **portal.sos.state.nm.us/OVR/WebPages/AbsenteeApplication.aspx**. All ballots must be returned to either the County Clerk's Office or any election day polling location before 7 p.m. on Election Day.

# **Splitting Votes and Taking Names**

Ponzlov and Withers face off against Lord in race for House District 22 seat

emocrat Fred Ponzlov and independent candidate Zach Withers are vying to knock Republican incumbent Stefani Lord out of office in the race for House District 22. Lord, who lives in the East Mountains, was elected to the seat in 2020. This is one of the few races during New Mexico's 2024 election season where three candidates are running against each other.

Democratic candidate Fred Ponzlov said he is not sure how having an independent candidate on the ballot will affect the election results, but he supports opening the state's primaries to voters who are not registered Democrats or Republicans.

"It all depends on if any of Stefani Lord's Republican base vote for Zach Withers who is a really nice guy. I would be thrilled if he won," Ponzlov said. "If the Republicans are tired enough of Stefani to vote for an independent, I think I'd have a chance. There's so much fabrication going on and lying going on, it's hard to sort through it." Lord, however, said she stands with the current primary system and thinks it's important for candidates to choose a party, ensuring they receive adequate representation in the election. While she agrees that having an independent on the ticket will split the vote, it won't affect the number of votes she receives.

"I think the independent will pull more votes away from the Democrat based on the things that he has said, and his opinions on politics," she said. "I don't wanna minimize the fact that if an independent wants to run they should be running under an independent ticket."

Withers said when he submitted his ballot petition, he was told he was the only independent running in the surrounding eight districts, and he has gotten the impression from speaking to many people in the community that he will likely split both the Democratic and Republican vote.

"Our district was extremely gerrymandered in the last redistricting," Withers said. "It is one of the most reliably conservative districts in the state. While I grew up in a

very conservative, Christian, military household, I do not at all support the current position the Republican Party is taking. I am also not at all aligned with the Democratic Party on the issues that I am running on."

Ponzlov said that one of the major issues that needs to be addressed in District 22 is illiteracy, and that education is key to reducing crime in New Mexico.

"Seventy-five percent of all the people [committing] crimes in Albuquerque are high school dropouts. Seventy-six percent of all incarcerated are high school dropouts. So what does that tell you? Keep these kids in school, find a way to make them interested in getting a high school degree," Ponzlov said. "Now the Republicans will say, 'Shoot them, give them longer jail sentences.' That's not gonna fix a thing. You have to be proactive, not reactive."

Ponzlov said Lord has some ideas and plans that are dangerous to New Mexicans, especially her stance on Second Amendment rights.

"She wants to get rid of all background checks for guns,"

Ponzlov said. "So someone could get out of prison on a Tuesday, buy their AK-47 on a Wednesday and kill someone on Thursday."

Lord's campaign website says she is running for reelection "to continue the fight against radical left-wing policies that do not represent New Mexicans or our values. Over the past two years, she has seen outside money flowing into our state given to radicals who present extremist bills that harm the people of our state and our way of life."

She said that the East Mountains are a complicated area with overlapping bipartisan issues, like crime and even human trafficking.



Democrat Bill Clinton BOMBED Iraq to take voters' attention away from his sex with Monica Lewinsky. Democrat Carter CELEBRATED as his






onald Trump's vice presidential pick Sen. JD Vance seems to dislike weed, but it may not affect the election now that the issue has been pushed to the back burner.

Most of the cannabis rhetoric around the upcoming election has died down in recent weeks as the presidential race tightens. Depending on the poll, either side has a chance of winning the election, and both sides appear to have forgotten about the weed vote. During the recent vice presidential debate, moderators failed to ask either candidate about marijuana. Despite strong voter support for reforming policies around the drug, neither major party has been outspoken about its plans for marijuana.

Vice President Kamala Harris — who has advocated for cannabis policy reform during her tenure in the Biden administration — has remained mostly silent on the topic while on the campaign trail in recent months.

That could be because Trump recently flipped on the subject, saying he feels that no one should be in jail for marijuana

and policy should be left up to states. This combined with Harris' record of jailing Black cannabis users and opposing legalization while serving as California's attorney general may make discussing the topic in any way too damaging for her campaign.

Harris' vice presidential pick, Tim Walz, on the other hand, has an exemplary record of supporting cannabis reform.

Vance's weed history is often overlooked as well. Of the four individuals in this political soup, his position on marijuana is the most archaic.

Last November, voters in Vance's home state of Ohio approved the legalization of adult-use marijuana with nearly 56% in favor. During an interview with conservative talk show host Bob Frantz, Vance said he would be voting "no" on legalization, saying he wanted to be able to take his kid to dinner without being "slammed in the face with the smell of weed." He said places where recreational-use marijuana is legal are "like an open air drug market."

He also claimed that when states legalize marijuana, traffic fatalities go up and usage among children goes up.

However, in a sign of the times, Vance appeared to give soft support to decriminalization early on in the Frantz interview.

"If you're caught with a joint," he said, "I don't think you should be thrown in prison for it."

A further sign of the times is how the Trump team responded to Vance's weed position.

Last month, a 271-page dossier on Vance compiled by the Trump campaign was leaked as part of an alleged hack at the hands of the Iranian government. In the dossier, Vance's position on legalization is listed under the section, "Vance's Notable Vulnerabilities

With Moderates." The document cites an interview in which Vance said legalization increased use among the "lower class" and caused a number of "social problems."

As a U.S. senator, Vance voted against the SAFER Banking Act, which would have allowed financial institutions to do business with marijuana companies without the danger of federal prosecution. The bill represents one of the few cannabis reforms supported by lawmakers on both sides of the aisle and considered a fairly modest reform backed by most moderates.

Since then, Vance has gotten somewhat softer on marijuana, saying policies should be left up to individual states. That means between Trump, Harris, Walz and Vance, the most conservative view on marijuana is that it should be decriminalized at the federal level and left up to states to craft their own policies.

But don't start buying streamers and noisemakers just yet. With Trump voicing support for weed reform and Harris avoiding the topic completely, the issue is likely to disappear altogether. Republicans — traditionally opposed to cannabis reform of any kind — are unlikely to highlight Trump's progressive attitude toward the drug, and Democrats — traditionally the pro-weed party — are unlikely to allow the conversation to veer toward Harris' ugly past. It would actually serve both parties to just ignore the issue for now.



# Florida Lawmaker Accuses State of Propaganda

Pizzo (D) recently sued the state over a TV ad that encouraged voters to oppose a legalization initiative that will be on the ballot in November.

Pizzo is accusing the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) of using taxpayer money to produce the ad in an attempt to influence the election, which is illegal under Florida law.

The ad, which ran in September as a public service announcement, warns that law enforcement has a difficult time detecting when a driver is under the influence of marijuana and claims that DUIs increase in states that legalize recreational weed. The ad also warns that insurance premiums increase when a driver is arrested for a DUI.

Pro-cannabis group Smart and Safe Florida, the force behind the legalization initiative, reportedly sent cease-and-desist letters to 54 TV stations running the ad, claiming it was statefunded political messaging pedaled as a public service announcement. Pizzo's lawsuit says FDOT is not allowed to spend money on elections and is seeking an injunction against the state's use of tax dollars.

# Nebraska officials question weed petitions

Nebraska Secretary of State Bob Evnen is questioning whether nearly 100,000 signatures for

medical marijuana legalization were legitimate.

Evnen has filed a claim in court alleging most of the signatures gathered were likely invalid after one of the petition circulators was accused of faking 202 signatures. The circulator was investigated after a county election commissioner found misspelled names, the names of deceased individuals and wrong dates of birth on 38 petition sheets. Investigators claim the circulator chose the names at random from a phone book. He is now facing felony charges.

Evnen and the state's Attorney General's Office are

questioning whether signatures notarized by Notary Public Jacy Todd — who notarized the circulator's fake signatures — should be thrown out. Evnen also claims that other circulators and notaries should be investigated for fraud.

#### Missouri court considers tax stacking

A Missouri appeals court is hearing a case over whether counties are allowed to stack a weed tax on top of city taxes. The argument is reportedly over the word "and."

According to the state's constitutional amendment legalizing marijuana, "local

government" is defined as "an incorporated area, a village, town, or city; and, in the case of an unincorporated area, a county."

Attorneys for St. Louis and St. Charles counties argue that the "and" in the amendment allows them to add a county marijuana tax onto local city marijuana taxes.

However, attorneys for a local dispensary argue that the "and" indicates the tax can be levied by a village, town, city or county, depending on an area's incorporated status.

No hearing date for the case has been set.


